SUBJECT: New Zane Bill (S-3668)
Rice Bill (S-3669)

I have had an opportunity to quickly review the assault firearms bills introduced by Senators Zane and Rice on July 25, 1991.

Senator Zane's new bill is identical to his previous measure with the following exceptions:

1. This bill does not downgrade the offenses
2. This bill does not eliminate civil liability.

Senator Rice's bill does the following:

1. Allows all persons who lawfully acquired assault firearms prior to May 30, 1990 to register them within 180 days of the date the bill would take effect. (No continuing option to sell or certify inoperable, but persons who have certified inoperable need not register)
2. Reduces registration fee from \$50 to \$5.
3. Does not reduce license fee.
4. Provides restrictions on transportation and use.
5. Requires heirs of licensed or registered firearms to surrender the firearms or transfer them to a person who can lawfully purchase and possess.

(This bill appears to have some minor technical problems)
