Several years ago, a federal report called New Jersey's Pinelands "the largest undeveloped stretch of land on the Eastern Seaboard." But, the report added, "no sound plan has emerged" for the Pinelands region. The memorandum outlines present and proposed federal and state laws and regulations which the impact on this part of southern New Jersey.

The Code of Federal Regulations (40 CFR 130.17) requires states to revise WATER QUALITY; water quality standards every three years. New Jersey's last revision took place in December 1974. The State Department of Environmental Protection is currently reviewing technology in regard to its proposed revisions, DEP has proposed that it adopt regulations which will require State approval of each septic tank or other sewage facility in the 760-square mile area of Ocean, Burlington, and Camden counties, which is now correct.

Two hundred acres in Ocean County were purchased in the spring of 1977, for a price of \$100,000. The Foundation is actively negotiating for another 20,000 acres, hoping for a 1978 closing. Half of a fund drive of \$750,000 for that purchase is now in hand.
