

Hula Dancing the NJDPES Way

Who was that man in the grass skirt? That's what inquiring DEPE employees were asking after Dennis Hart, administrator of Wastewater Facilities Regulation, was spotted hula dancing in the courtyard of the 401 East State Street headquarters building in 90-plus degree heat recently.

It seems Dennis made a bet with his staff a year ago that if they could double the 200 NJ Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NJDPES) permits issued in fiscal 1991, he would celebrate by doing the hula in public. So when the 401st permit of FY92 squeaked through the approval process before the July 1 deadline, it was time for Dennis to make good on his promise.

"I challenged them to double their output and they did it," said Dennis, a 33-year-old East Brunswick resident. "I had to keep my end of the bargain."
